Agency Overview



The North Londonderry Township Police Department provides full-service law enforcement to approximately 9,000 residents, as well as businesses and visitors throughout North Londonderry Township. The department emphasizes professional, fair, and responsive policing while working in close partnership with township leadership and community partners.

Through 24-hour patrol coverage and proactive enforcement, the department responds to approximately 1,600 calls for service annually and is staffed by 10 sworn officers, focusing on maintaining public safety and preserving quality of life.




5-Year Calls for Service Trend






5-Year Enforcement Trends




5-Year Arrest Trends




5-Year Crash Trends
